Largest Grant Award	Dr. Gail Dickinson Dr. Shana Pribesh	Dr.'s Dickinson and Pribesh have received over \$291,000 from the Institute of Museum and Library Services for their proposal "Academic Achievement and School Libraries." Additionally, Dr.'s Dickinson and Pribesh have worked with Dr. Katherine Bucher on a \$590,000 IMLS grant developing a Distributed School Library Media Graduate Program in Virginia.
Most Collaborative Grant Award	Ms. Sharon Davis, Mr. Mickey Kosloski, Ms. Tiffany Machado Mr. Dave Netherton	Over \$24,000 from Cotton , Inc. to develop and disseminate instructional materials. Specifically, Cottonecology is an educational program developed by Old Dominion University's Fashion Merchandising Program for high school and college students of textile, fashion merchandising, and related fields. This project teaches students about the properties of cotton as a renewable, recyclable, and sustainable fiber. The goal is to increase student awareness and knowledge of cotton and its environmentally friendly properties.
New Investigator Grant Award	Dr. James Onate	Dr. Onate received over \$68,000 from the U.S. Public Health Service for his proposal on "Lower Extremity Assessment Program for Collegiate Athletes." Dr. Onate is Director of the Sports Medicine Research Laboratory at Old Dominion University. His current research projects include evaluating biomechanical aspects of jump-landing tasks, utilization of motor learning theories to influence motor skill acquisition and dynamic movement patterns, clinical assessments of postural control, and military sports medicine injury prevention screenings.
Teaching Innovation and Excellence Award	Dr. Richard Overbaugh	Dr. Overbaugh is responsible for teaching the Educational Applications of Computers course and a variety of graduate courses for the Educational Curriculum and Instruction Department. Dr. Overbaugh collaborates with faculty and adjuncts to insure all sections of ECI 304 contain new teaching methodologies and technologies, performance-based learning, and alternative assessments.
Service Award	Dr. Gail Dickinson	Dr. Dickinson demonstrates outstanding service at the local, state, and national levels. She consistently recruits and advises students for all levels of the school library media specialist program. Dr. Dickinson's commitment at the state level includes presenting and committee service at the annual Virginia Educational Media Association Conference. On the national level, Dr. Dickenson is actively involved with the American Association of School Librarians and the American Library Association. Dr. Dickenson is also very active with NCATE at the national level where she serves on multiple committees and chairs the Process and Evaluation Subcommittee of the Specialty Area Studies Board.

Publications Award	Dr. Sharon Raver-Lampman	Dr. Raver-Lampman is internationally known for her scholarship in early childhood special education. Her publications for the past two years include a recently released text, five peer-reviewed publications, and two non-refereed publications. Dr. Raver-Lampman's publications appear in top international journals. She has presented multiple papers internationally, some which have been published in both English and Ukrainian.
Instructional Publications Award	Dr. Gary Morrison	Dr. Morrison is internationally known for his teaching, service, and scholarship in the field of instructional design and technology. His book <i>Designing Effective Instruction</i> is currently in its fifth edition and consistently ranks as a top text by reviewers. Additionally, the design model Dr. Morrison outlines in his text is frequently cited in research publications and is used in multiple disciplines and organizations, including the Department of Homeland Security.
Sara & Rufus Tonelson Award	Dr. Sharon Raver-Lampman	The Tonelson Award recipient must demonstrate an outstanding record in teaching, scholarship, and service. It is clear that our award recipient, Dr. Sharon Raver-Lampman, has performed well in all three areas. For teaching, she has received the SCHEV Outstanding University Professor Award and the Darden College of Education's Teaching Excellence Award. Her scholarship includes the publications previously mentioned as well as multiple presentations, two funded grants, and receipt of the Darden College of Education's Instructional Publications Award. Dr. Raver-Lampman's service includes multiple committees and workshops, service on two journal review boards, and serving as a Fulbright scholar at the University of Ukraine. Clearly, Dr. Raver-Lampman's teaching, scholarship, and service accomplishments are exceptional.
